NEBAGAMON HISTORY SPOTLIGHT:

Lake Nebagamon Post Office:

The first Post Office in Lake Nebagamon was opened in 1893. J.A. Chisholm was postmaster in 1921. Ludy Drolson started as clerk in 1921. The post office was then in front of Mr. Chisholm's store. In 1934 Earl Persons became postmaster and Viola Persons became clerk, moving the post office across the street. Our current Postmaster recently received an email sharing some history.

My grandfather was postmaster in Lake Nebagamon 87 years ago. Haha. Seriously. He was appointed on June 8, 1934. His name was Earl L Persons. He lived there as a child with his parents David and Minnie Persons. And returned as a young man with a new wife (my grandmother Viola) and child, little Freddy. Times were tough and the young couple moved back in with the parents. (sounds familiar in todays world too) I am sending a photo of the family in front of the house. Which is still there and looks amazing. I visited a few years ago and took a picture. As yours is a small town I hope you recognize it, because I cannot remember the address. I would love for you to share the photo with your customers that live there.

In the photo, Earl, the future postmaster, is the younger child (blurry face because he couldn't hold still long enough for the old camera) next to Minnie. His older brother was named Harlan.

In the latter part of 1937, Ludy Drolson became acting postmaster until he was commissioned as postmaster in November of 1937. Several people were postal clerks until the middle of 1941 when Evelyn Drolson became clerk, remaining as such until 1963.

In May of 1952, Mr. Drolson retired as postmaster to become rural mail carrier after the death of Elmer Oaks and William Arnold became postmaster and was such in the old post office for 13 years.

In May if 1966, the post office was moved into a new building, the former showrooms of Vennerstrom's Ford Inc. Mr. Arnold had been the postmaster in this office for at least 10 years.

Mr. Ludy Drolson retired from the postal service November 20, 1964, after 40 years of service.

The rural route began as 53 miles long. Current 2021 data says the rural route is now 140 miles long.

After Mrs. Drolson retired, there were several different clerks, among them Pearl Finell, working the longest number of years.

Currently, we have Deb Gilroy as our postmaster, Kamie Wiss and Jessica Saker are the clerks. Lake Nebagamon has 2 routes, 1 route delivers 95 miles and the other route delivers 50 miles. (140 miles total). Lake Nebagamon carriers are Jim Burgraff and Bob Cheever. Lake Nebagamon has Paul Mattson to deliver in Poplar, and Rachel Lind to deliver Maple. Lake Nebagamon is lucky to have relief carriers, Janet Dokken, Ashley Zakowitz and Jennifer Dokken.

As our weather is turning into winter, let this also be a reminder to make sure your mailboxes are secure and kept free of snow to allow our carriers to be able to get your mail to your home. Below are guidelines for setting up your mailboxes and the village ordinance to comply with the privilege of receiving mail. Also remember as the snow gets heavier and plow drivers are clearing the road, remember accidents will happen but they will do all efforts to make sure roads are safe and clear and sometimes snow will fly into the sides of road and knock over your mailbox. Be kind and work together to keep your properties safe for these plow drivers and mail carriers.



These are guidelines. Specific requirements may vary by route or location, so check with the Postmaster before installing or modifying a mailbox.

Measure from the ground to the bottom of the mailbox (see diagram). Height requirements will vary if serviced by a carrier using a private vehicle.

These are the recommended heights for delivery on the routes in this office but <u>always</u> check with the local Postmaster before installing a malbox.

Jumbo size (15h x 11w in.)-39 inches from the ground to the bottom of the mailbox

Large size (11h x 8.75w in.)—41-42 inches from the ground to the bottom of the mailbox

Standard size (9h x 7w in.)-42-44 inches in from the ground to the bottom of mailbox

Jumbo size rural mailboxes are the preferred type mailbox. They are big enough to hold an accumulation of mail and smaller parcels. This saves the carrier time in delivery of the route and may save you a trip to the Post Office to pick up items that do not fit in a smaller sized box or if you have loose animals, or haven't cleared snow from driveway or walkways. The bigger the mailbox, the better.

INSTALLATION AND PLACEMENT

The best mailbox supports are stable but bend or fall away if a car hits them. The Federal Highway Administration recommends:

- A 4" x 4" wooden support or a 2"-diameter standard steel or aluminum pipe.
- Avoid unyleiding and potentially dangerous supports, like heavy metal pipes, concrete posts, and farm equipment (e.g., milk cans filled with concrete)
- . Bury your post no more than 24" deep.

Mailbox must display the number on the side of single mailboxes visible to the approaching carrier or on the door of grouped mailboxes. If the mailbox is on a street other than the one on which the customer resides, the street name and house number must be on the mailbox. The street number, box number, and any other address information must be inscribed in contrasting color in neat letters and numerals not less than 1 inch in height. In all instances, placing the owner's name on the box is optional, but not recommended by the Postal Service. Customers should also paint mailboxes and supports/posts and keep them nust-free. Advertising on mailboxes and mailbox supports is prohibited. In areas where snow removal is a problem, the Postal Service suggests using a semi-arch or extended arm-type support which allows snowplows to sweep near or under mailboxes without damaging supports and provides easy access to the mailboxes by carriers and customers. Generally, mailboxes should be installed at a height of 41–45 inches from the road surface to the bottom of the mailbox or point of mail entry. However, because of varying road and curb conditions and other factors, the Postal Service recommends that customers contact their local Post Office.

The Postal Service does not regulate mailbox supports in any way except for purposes of carrier safety and delivery efficiency. Posts and other supports for curbside mail-boxes are owned and controlled by customers, who are responsible for ensuring that posts are neat, adequate and comply with federal, state or local highway regulations.

-The box should be located so that the delivery vehicle is as far off the roadway as possible, while still allowing the approach and departure from the box to be solid on level surface (gravel, stone, paved).

Maintenance

Your mailbox takes a serious beating from the weather, especially in the winter. We suggest a routine mailbox check-up every spring. You might just need to...

- Replace loose hinges on the door
- · Ensure the door is operational
- · Repaint rusty or peeling parts
- · Remount the post, if it's loose
- Replace missing or faded house numbers

And year-round keep obstructions away from your mailbox. Your carrier may not deliver your mail if there's a garbage can, car, shrub, snowdrift, or unfriendly dog in front of it.


